What is an accessible home?

Is the construction or modification of housing to enable independent living for persons with disabilities. Accessibility is achieved through architectural design, but also by integrating accessibility features such as modified furniture, shelves and cupboards, or even electronic devices in the home.



Howard County Livable Tax Credit

To receive a credit you must:

- Own property subject to the County property tax.
- Install an eligible feature on an existing residence that is your principal residence when the feature is installed.
- Obtain a permit from the Department of Inspections, Licenses, & Permits (DILP) for the work (even if the scope of the work would not normally require a permit and inspections).






What costs are eligible for credit?

- Incurred within 12 months before the application for the credit
- For an eligible feature, including costs to install the feature
- Were paid by you and were not, and will not be, reimbursed by any entity
- Exceed \$500.00

A no-step front door entrance with a threshold that does not exceed ½ inch in depth with tapered advance and return surface



An installed ramp creating a no-step entrance





An interior doorway that provides a 32-inch wide or wider clear opening







36 inch or wider exterior doorway with exterior lighting

- Maneuvering space in a bathroom or kitchen
- Accessibility-enhanced bathroom



Exterior or interior elevator, lift, or stair glide unit



Alarms, appliances, and controls designed to assist an individual with a sensory disability





Who can I call to assess my home?

 An Architect – preferably an Aging In Place Specialist (CAPS).

2. A contractor with an Aging In Place (CAPS) designation.




What does an Accessible Home Evaluation Entail?

Meet with the Homeowner to decide what currently works about the house and what does not. Possibly include an OT in this meeting.

Full house assessment with recommendations and cost estimates.







































